From Your Church Council

The Jefferson UMC church council has approved two capital improvement projects that address safety issues on our property. The two projects include repairing our parking lot (repairing potholes and resealing) and repairing the canopy over the entry door to the social hall. These projects benefit the safety of us all. The total cost of these capital improvements is estimated to be \$18,100. The parking lot costs \$13,500, and the canopy costs \$4,600. Since we have already incurred a significant unexpected expense of \$11,200 to repair the social hall air conditioning, we are seeking contributions, in addition to your regular offerings, to a capital improvement fund to help cover the cost of the parking lot and canopy repairs. If you contribute online via Vanco, there is a category for the capital fund. If you contribute through the offering plate, please mark your additional contributions for the capital fund. "Rooted in Christ" Written by Pastor Tom Hoeke

"I have told you this so that my joy may be in you and that your joy may be complete. My command is this: Love each other as I have loved you..." John 15:11-12

Connie and I have a 3 ½ year-old Newfie-doodle named Mocha. She is a very pleasant, gentle, and loving dog. Before Mocha, there was Sierra, a golden retriever, Tacoma, a black lab, and before her, there were Shadow, a golden retriever, and Sable, a collie. Over the years, we have tried to train our dogs to at least obey the basic commands. However, they have a few things to teach us. They teach us how to love and care for one another, how to have fun and relax, and how to follow. Consider the following:

- Greeting people they are the first ones at the door, greeting with their tails wagging as if to say I missed you so much, and I am glad you are back. It doesn't matter whether one has been gone for a week, a day, or even just an hour.
- Display happiness and joy dogs are not afraid to show their joy as they jump up and down or run around in circles when it's time to have fun.
- Relax ever watch a dog on a warm sunny day with a nice fresh bowl of water, just relaxing and taking it easy
- Know when to keep quiet and show compassion –
 when one of us is feeling sad or upset, they sense
 that and nuzzle right up to the person feeling that
 way, quietly staying there until they feel better.
- Remain friends even in the midst of conflict When they get yelled at for something they have done wrong, they don't get upset. They just back off a bit, but if you call their name, they are right there in a second, waiting to please you and be your friend.
- Be part of a fellowship group When one dog barks, others do so as well, even if they have no idea why.
 They just want to belong to the group and be part of the action.
- Watch out for each other. When we had two dogs at a time, and one of them was left outside while the other was inside, the one inside would remind us that the other was still outside. When we let her in, the other checked things out to make sure everything was okay. Loyalty is number one dogs will follow you anywhere, anytime.

Think about it for a moment. Aren't these all things that Jesus taught us? He taught us to love and to follow him.

- Greet each warmly and gladly every time we see one another
- Show it when you are happy show your joy in Christ
- Relax and get the rest that you need. A life of discipleship cannot be effective if we are worn down and overburdened. If we don't take care of ourselves, we can't care for others.
- Know and act when you need to care for someone and do so quietly
- If someone gets upset at you for doing something wrong, don't pout, back off a bit, apologize, and remain friends
- Make every effort to be part of a fellowship group – laugh and play with your friends in the church
- Watch out for each other and make sure that the other is ok
- Follow Jesus every day, all the time, wherever he leads you hold nothing back in following Jesus
